PROGRAM

ECC offers a LPN to RN Bridge program leading to an Associate of Applied Science degree in nursing, designed to provide students who hold a Missouri LPN license the educational mobility to complete the RN classes in a format that specifically meets their needs. The evening and everyother-weekend format allows LPNs to still work, perhaps parttime, while taking courses.

The nursing program is two semesters in length with a one semester, bridge-specific prerequisite nursing course. All of the program prerequisites and general education requirements must be completed prior to the nursing courses. Prerequisites can be completed either part-time or full-time.

The LPN to RN Bridge program, offered at the ECC-Rolla location, utilizes some distance-learning technology to enhance access and flexibility. Upon completion, graduates are eligible to apply to write the NCLEX-RN Exam for licensure as registered nurses.

TRANSFFR OPTIONS

The AAS degree is designed for students seeking employment right after graduation. However, many of the credits, particularly the general education electives earned with this degree, are accepted as transfer credit by four-year schools. Please note that these decisions are made by the bachelor degree-granting institution, not ECC. Students wanting to transfer are advised to contact the institution of their choice before beginning a program or reviewing other ECC degree plans. The College has articulation agreements with several BSN completion programs to promote a seamless progression to the next educational level.

CARFFR

Registered nurses (RNs) are hands-on professionals who provide focused and highly personalized care. These professionals promote health, prevent disease and help patients and families cope with illness. They have a unique scope of practice, yet work collaboratively with all members of the healthcare team.

Registered nurses assess a patient's health and help perform diagnostic tests and analyze results. They also operate medical equipment, administer a variety of treatments and medications and assist with patient follow-up/rehabilitation. In addition, these healthcare professionals develop and manage a nursing plan of care, educate people on a variety of health issues and serve as advocates for patients, families and communities.

A majority of registered nurses practice in hospitals, though a growing number are employed in longterm care settings, out-patient surgery centers or rehabilitation centers. Others work in community health, industrial or school nursing, clinics and physician offices. The field has a variety of opportunities ranging from entry-level professional to doctoral-level researcher/practitioner.

EMPLOYMENT AND SALARY INFORMATION

The registered nurse profession is experiencing faster-than-average job growth, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. By 2032, the number of positions is expected to increase by 6 percent. In May 2022, the mean annual earnings of registered nurses in Missouri were \$71,860. About 193,100 openings for registered nurses are projected each year, on average, over the decade. Many of those openings are expected to result from the need to replace workers who transfer to different occupations or exit the labor force, such as to retire.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

To enter the program, students must have completed:

- High school diploma or the equivalent (documentation must be sent to the registration office)
- Application for admission to ECC
- A placement test as specified by the college (some coursework requires minimum placement results)
- An undisciplined Missouri LPN license
- A cumulative college GPA of 2.75 or better
- 75% or better composite score on HESI A2 Admission Test in last two years
- Score of 750 or better on the HESI LPN to RN Mobility Exam in the last two years
- Successful completion of NUR 103 in the last two years
- Completion of prerequisites with a "C" or better
- Satisfactory criminal background check and drug screening once accepted to the program
- Complete Nursing application on file by specified deadline

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PROGRAM OF STUDY

- CHM 106 Chemistry for Health Science Lecture/Lab or one year High School Chemistry with a "C" or better (within five years)
- BIO 111 General Biology Lecture/Lab or two years high school biology with lab (must have at least a "B" grade within the last five years)

Prerequisites for Microbiology

- BIO 111 General Biology Lecture/ Lab or two years high school biology with lab (must have at least a "B" grade within the last five years)

Prerequisites for Successful Transition in Nursing

- Current undisciplined Missouri LPN license or eligible to sit for NCLEX-PN
- Intermediate Algebra, Contemporary Math, or Statistics

ALL college level science courses MUST be no more than five years old with a grade of "C" or better.

Additional Information

In order to achieve success in this program, a student can expect to spend a minimum of 20-30 hours per week, outside of class, studying and preparing for class and clinical experiences. Some examples include: practicing skills in the lab, preparing for clinical assignments, studying for exams, preparing for class, developing written assignments and presentations.
